The reasons why some airlines have temporarily cancelled international flights to Caracas are too complex to describe them in detail here. They are partially political and partially a result of Venezuela's exchange rate system.

The good news is: Iberia offers cheap flights from several European destinations to Caracas, especially German cities (e.g., Frankfurt am Main, Dusseldorf, Munich). From North America a variety of airlines (e.g., Santa Barbara, Copa Airlines, Avianca) are regularly operating to Caracas.

In addition, there are several other convenient options to get to Venezuela via neighbouring countries. Venezuela is easily reachable by plane from several Colombian cities, including Bogotá. Connecting flights from Colombia to Venezuela are quiet frequent and very reasonable priced. Another frequently used way of getting here is through Manaus, Brazil – Boa Vista – Santa Elena. There are relatively cheap flights from North America (e.g., Miami, NYC, Toronto) or Europe to Manaus. From Manaus you can either fly (1h) or take a luxury bus (10h) to Boa Vista, which is so close to Santa Elena that busses and taxis operate daily (2:30h; taxis cost no more than €10). We are always there for advice in case you have any inquiries.
